GLOBAL & COMPARATIVE STUDIES

As a Global and Comparative Studies major at BSC, you'll understand and engage the contemporary world as a global system, including nation-states and transnational organizations. You will analyze the historical emergence of the global system, identify trends, and make projections, as well as digging into complex global problems such as socioeconomic and political development, environmental sustainability, and international security.

The major is designed to prepare students to pursue graduate degrees or directly enter a range of fields, including foreign service/diplomacy, international development, international business, higher education, issue advocacy, humanitarian assistance, journalism, media, and communications. Many recent graduates have served in the Peace Corps or are working at the United Nations or in various international non-governmental organizations.

The organizing themes of the major are:

- social and economic change;
- power dynamics, and;
- the interactions within and between the elements of a global society.

For this interdisciplinary major, you will take courses in political science, economics, sociology, and BSC's Urban Environmental Studies program. Besides the coursework, our strong connections to our alumni enable us to help students explore internships, study abroad, foreign and domestic travel opportunities so you'll get hands-on opportunities that will help you succeed.

Students must complete at least two Exploration Term projects during their time at BSC. Choose from on- and off-campus projects, independent study or research, group and individual studytravel, service-learning, and internships. You might attend the Sundance Film Festival with a film studies professor; see great works of art in New York and Paris; conduct an experiment with a faculty member; volunteer in Africa, San Francisco, or right here in Birmingham; read popular novels or study the origins of Southern cooking; explore the tropical rainforest or Galapagos Islands; produce a play in just three weeks; or take on an internship in your chosen field.
